Understanding Incest

What is Incest?

Incest is sexual contact between family members or close relatives. This can include people related by:

- **Blood** (biological family)
- Marriage (step-relations, in-laws)
- Adoption or other family ties

Across most cultures and religions, incest is **considered morally wrong**. In the United States, incest is also a criminal offense in most states, and laws may also prevent certain relatives from marrying.

Why This Matters

- Incest is one of the most common forms of child sexual abuse.
- Children often face family pressure not to speak up or are not supported after disclosing.
- Many offenders show **no prior warning signs**, making prevention difficult.
- If a person in the family has previously abused a child and faced no consequences, they are at higher risk of reoffending.

Remember: *Most children who disclose sexual abuse are telling the truth.*

What You Can Do Right Now

- 1. **Believe the Child** Your support is critical to their safety and healing.
- 2. Stay Calm and Listen Avoid reacting with anger or disbelief.
- 3. Write Down Details Include names, dates, and what was said.
- 4. **Report Immediately** Call CPS or law enforcement right away.
- 5. **Do Not Investigate Yourself** Leave questioning to trained professionals.

Important:

In most states, it is mandatory to report sexual abuse once you learn of it.

You can report abuse even if it happened years ago and the victim is now an adult.
